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Principal's foreword

Introduction

We are please to report on the significant progress of Bentley Park College in 2008.

The College demonstrated continued enrolment grow in 2008, with our feeder numbers moving into Year 8 increasing our secondary enrolments.

The major strategic foci of 2008 were: Literacy Development models for staff; Information and Communication Technologies(ICT) involving Laptop programs; Developing Performance Framework for Classified Officers and a continuation of focus around student performance outcomes.

2008 saw Bentley Park College's Literacy Strategy being embedded through staff support. Teams of Literacy Leaders were instrumental in ensuring explicit teaching of literacies occurred across many key learning areas. Good quality practice from research and professional development worked hand in hand with good practice from our own excellent teaching practitioners to enhance literacy learning. Student performance benchmarks in literacy demonstrated the gains through this capability building approach.

A second focus was surrounding student and staff access to technologies. The Computer for Teachers project delivered 128 laptops for teachers, whilst a 'laptop' class for students and additional hardware purchases help improve student satisfaction in the area of ICT. Other infrastructure developments were aimed at capitalising on greater access in 2009.

The College's continued focus around student performance outcomes saw team level and faculty level leadership emerging to drive improvements. Targeted intervention again contributed to improvements witnessed in key school wide and statewide benchmarks. Whilst there is always a need for continued improvement, there were pleasing longer term trends emerging to testify to the sustained work of our hard working staff.

It was a vibrant year capped off with an excellent Presentation Evening at the Convention Centre. A 1000 strong audience joined to celebrate the achievements of our students.

Future outlook

During 2008, Bentley Park College enrolled in two pilot programs around Literacy across Key Learning areas. The heavy focus on capability building of all staff will continue to lift student results.

2008 saw a success rate of 75% in Academic, Effort and Behaviour ratings for students across the whole campus. This benchmark is a core consideration for 2009.

Whilst individual results of seniors continued to reflect high achievement and good articulation to career and pathway choices, there is a continued need to improve in these indicators. As the cohort numbers grow, we are confident of gains in 2009.

2009 is expected to display further secondary growth, based on a large intake of Year 8 students from around the district.

How computers are used to assist learning

Across the campus over 550 computers are deployed into classrooms in styles to suit the learning.

Computer classrooms, library computers, mini-labs and smaller numbers of computers within the class are accessed by students.

Students competed in Robotics Challenges and achieved Regional recognition through Awards for ICT.

A one to one laptop class in Year 4 was formed, to create a media and technology rich environment for learning.


We love to see full attendance at information evenings, parent teacher interview nights, presentation night, sporting days, P&C meetings and extra-curricular activities.

Post-school destination information

At the time of publishing this School Annual Report, the results of the 2008 Year 12 post-school destinations survey, Next Step – Student Destination Report for the school were not available. Value added

2008 continued to build a strong Literacy backbone across the whole of campus. Further staff training in Literacies across the key learning areas occurred and our Literacy mentors supported staff in key strategic areas across the campus. This is aimed at improving the explicit nature of teaching literacies for all of our teaching staff.

The Triennial school review demonstrated sustained improvements 2006-2008 in areas of Literacy, Curriculum alignment and use of student performance data in a cyclical improvement process.

An additional 12 teaching staff gained ICT Pedagogical Licences.

Two areas flagged for the following 3 year cycle include an Urban Indigenous strategy initially focussing on attendance and cultural identity and a Full Range of Students Strategy to target 'value added' processes to maintain and grow our future cohorts.

Parent, student and teacher satisfaction with the school

The College 2008 Year 3,5,7,9 statewide performance data, school based reporting data and individual student performances did display continuation of upward trending. There is correlation with student and parent satisfaction levels in key areas of student outcomes and curriculum, where our community responds at levels similar to those of like schools. In the view of our parents and students, there is still work to continue to improve the learning climate experienced. In a time of significant change and a performance driven agenda, the staff satisfaction with work roles is at a similar level to those in like schools.
